





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For those wondering about historic homes in Bobcaygeon. Here is the link to the COKL heritage page. https://www.kawarthalakes.ca/.../heritage-designated... It explains the difference between heritage designated (registered) and heritage listed properties and also includes a list for both. In Bobcaygeon the library/museum building at 21 Canal Street is designated and the Edgewood Dry Stack wall (28 Boyd Street) has just recently been heritage designated. The Heritage committee has worked over the last year to identify and list properties in the COKL, including Bobcaygeon. 15 properties have been added for Bobcaygeon this year with more to come.
