New targets for measuring performance:


- 1. Residential waste disposed per capita
- 2. Total waste sent to landfill






Part 3 – Preparing for Tomorrow

Part 4: Strategy Update Initiatives - DRAFT

The initiatives were developed by reviewing best practices in similar jurisdictions, input from waste management staff, and through the public consultation process which helped shape the future vision for waste management.

13 recommended initiatives are categorized under

- Reduce,
- Reuse,
- Recycle, or
- Innovate



1 - Improve Access to Food and Organic Waste Recycling in Rural Communities

Pilot program for in-home composting units

2- Repairing and Sharing Programs

Support existing community-based reuse initiatives in accessible locations.



3 - Leaf and Yard Waste Program

Monthly Urban L&YW Collection and Call-in L&YW Collection Services for Rural Areas.

4 - Organic's Program Monitoring

Monitoring performance - waste audits and developing metrics that can be tracked year-over-year



5 - Expand Household Hazardous Waste Collection

Explore opportunities to expand HHW collection across the municipality. Some examples could include a mobile HHW depot, additional permanent HHW depot(s) and/ or increased education on existing HHW collection programs.

6 - Public Space Recycling Strategy

Develop a Public Space Recycling Strategy



7 - Agricultural Waste Diversion

This initiative would involve investigating opportunities to divert this waste stream away from the landfill

8 - Boat Wrap Diversion

Conduct a three year seasonal pilot program to manage boat wrap generated.





Assess the feasibility of expanding the diversion program to other active landfill sites, as well as identifying opportunities for other C&D waste streams (e.g., aggregates and glass) to be collected for diversion as markets are developed.

10 - Expand Mattress and Bulky Plastic Recycling Program

This initiative would involve expanding the mattress and bulky plastic recycling collection programs to the other City-owned sites for increased convenience and better accessibility amongst residents.



11 - Develop Targeted Promotion and Education Campaigns

Review the overall performance of the municipal waste management system, waste audit data, and diversion rates to determine opportunities for improving communications and develop targeted P&E campaigns.

12 - Corporate Waste Reduction Initiatives

Develop a working group, two meetings per year to discuss potential opportunities to reduce waste from City operations.



13 - Landfill Optimization

The City will investigate the feasibility of implementing landfill optimization techniques (e.g., expanding the Public Works soil diversion program, usage of alternative daily cover materials that take up little to no landfill space, and investigate the feasibility of implementing a waste shredder and GPS system a the Lindsay-Ops Landfill site to further improve waste compaction)



IWMS Update Impact Summary




The initiatives outlined in this IWMS update are anticipated to be implemented over the five-year strategy period.

The impact of the initiatives is anticipated to result in a 6% reduction in total waste disposed and a 12% reduction in residential disposal rate by 2029.

Source Separated Organics Program Update Kawartha

NEW! Organics Program grace period ends May 1, 2025

Dear Resident,

If you're receiving this letter your household is included in our Organics Program. With your help, in the first month of the program, we diverted almost 100 tonnes of organic waste from our landfills. Thank you to all those that have already been participating in the program!

Grace Period Ending

To maximize cost-effectiveness and meet targets, all eligible households must participate in the organics program. This letter is a reminder that sorting your food and organic waste from your regular garbage is now required at your address. The grace period ends on May 1, 2025.

Timeline

January: Bin delivery complete, organics collection started.

January Collection staff are placing "Oops" stickers on your green bin if it contains materials that are not acceptable in the program. You'll have the opportunity to sort your bin properly and put it back out the following week.

March: Notices will be distributed as a reminder that garbage with more than 10% organics will not be collected when full enforcement begins.

May 1, 2025: Garbage bags containing more than 10% organic materials will be left behind and will need to be properly sorted or disposed of at a landfill at the owner's expense.

New to the Organics Program?

Sorting your organic waste is easy! Use the kitchen catcher bin with a compostable bag for easy collection. Once full, transfer the bag to your rollout cart and bring it to your curb by 7am every Friday for pickup. If there is a holiday that week, pickup moves to Saturday.

Timeline

Source Separated Organics -Success

- 9 completed collections from January 1 to present
- Total of 191 tonnes diverted
- Continued success through communications and education plan

Non-Eligible Source Recycling Update



To review:

- Blue Box Regulation (O Reg. 391/21) was established to ensure producers of recycling are responsible for the management of these products
- The Regulation only includes recycling from eligible sources and producers are not responsible for the management of Non-Eligible Sources (NES)
- Municipalities were provided with transition dates and the full effects of the regulation come into effect as of January 1, 2026



What is an Eligible Source vs a Non-eligible Source?



Included: Eligible Sources

- Single family homes, multi-unit residential buildings & seasonal dwellings;
- Public & private schools;
- Long term care homes & retirement homes; and
- Public spaces along residential collection routes.



Excluded: Non-eligible Sources

- Businesses/ Commercial Properties;
- Places of worship;
- Municipal buildings;
- Daycares;
- Commercial farms;
- Charities;
- Campgrounds; and
- Public spaces not along residential collection routes (in the BIA's).



Update on Blue Box Regulation Impacts





- April 1, 2024 to December 31, **2025** (21months)
- CKL opted-out for curbside **collection** – Producers will be fully responsible for the operation, communication & administration of the Eligible sources.
- Co-collection of Eligible sources and NES is allowed during this period

Post Transition

- January 1, 2026 & thereafter
- Municipalities not fiscally or operationally responsible for the residential blue box program
- Producers will continue to be responsible for all Eligible sources.
- NES properties no longer able to be co-collected with Eligible properties (residences).

Update on Blue Box Regulation Impacts



What's happening now?

- On January 28, 2025, Council received Report WM2025-001, Update on Blue Box Options for Non-Eligible Sources (NES)
- The following recommendations were carried, that as of January 1, 2026:
 - NES properties <u>will not receive</u> curbside collection of recycling
 - The Waste Management By-law is amended to reflects the changes
 - The City sends letters to the NES properties affected
 - Staff continue to explore alternative to support the NES properties



Update on Blue Box Regulation Impacts



What's happening now?

- WM staff met with Purchasing to discuss joint procurement opportunities with other Municipalities
- Purchasing reached out to Kawartha collaborative purchasing group (KCPG) group to seek interest
- Letter has been drafted for NES properties to seek interest in support

Next steps:

- Continue to explore any responses from the KCPG
- WM staff to meet with CAM group to update City's webpage
- Letter to be mailed out to NES properties in March

Textile Program Update

What's happening?

- Request for service provider sent out in 2024 no bids received
- Followed-up with existing contractor and other service providers –no interest in continuing curbside service
- Drop-off and events services still offered through current contract
- Other municipalities no longer offering curbside collection

Next Steps:

- Promote drop off locations and event days
- News release drafted to update residents of curbside collection event cancellation
- Educate residents continued diversion efforts, scheduled bulk pick up options
