- While we've proudly recognized many incredible champions over the years, we realized there was one important voice missing from our celebration—the voice of our youth.

- Amplify youth leadership—recognizing the next generation of accessibility advocates,
- And build a culture of inclusion that will shape Kawartha Lakes for decades to come.

Honouring a Legacy



- In keeping with the tradition of the Barbara McArthur Award of Distinction—named in honour of our committee's founder and first Chair—we proposed that this new award also carry a meaningful name.
- We can think of no one more fitting than Kathryn Peeters.
- Kathryn was a former recipient of the Barbara McArthur Award and a shining example of what this new youth award represents.

Kathryn Peeters



- Diagnosed with a brain tumour as a child, Kathryn faced life with legal blindness, a seizure disorder, and cognitive impairment. But none of that stopped her. At just six years old, she began fundraising for paediatric brain tumour research and went on to speak at conferences and community events for 25 years.
- Later in life, Kathryn sustained a spinal cord injury that resulted in paraplegia. Rather than slow down, she became even more determined to raise awareness and advocate for change.
- We believe that naming this award in her honour will ensure her impact continues to inspire future generations.

Outstanding Contribution- Business: The Wheat Sheaf



The Wheat Sheaf restaurant is located in downtown Bobcaygeon and offers a great accessible location.

The restaurant, and it's staff, are accommodating for those with an array of visible and invisible disabilities.



Outstanding Contribution- Business: Symposium Cafe



The Symposium Cafe offers an accessible dining option in Lindsay.

The restaurant boasts accommodating seating areas and accessible washroom facilities that are open and easily accessed by mobility device users.



Outstanding Contribution- Business: Ken Reid Conservation Area



In order to make the trails and facilities open to move residents, an accessible washroom facility has been installed at Ken Reid Conservation.

This upgrade allows residents of varying abilities to hike the trails and have access to an accessible washroom.



Outstanding Contribution- Business: Trinity United Church Bobcaygeon



Trinity United Church is doing its best to make their facilities accessible to all.

From automatic door openers, well-maintained sidewalks, linking the parking lot to the sound system, and providing large print bulletins, the church is trying to break down barriers to their facility.




Outstanding Contribution- Business: Celebrations



Celebrations offers a lift to the main floor allowing patrons of all abilities to obtain access.

The primary gathering room is well lit, has a great audio system, and is barrier free.

The washroom facilities are some of the best accessible facilities in the City.



Outstanding Contribution- Business: CMS Web Solutions



Lindsay based CMS Web Solutions, has been developing accessible websites and providing digital accessibility education for over fifteen (15) years.



Outstanding Contribution- New Build or Modification: Fieldside Yoga



Fieldside Yoga boasts a barrier free washroom, designated accessible parking, automated doors, and an easily traversable open concept design. Locally, they are the only privately owned yoga studio in the City of Kawartha Lakes that is accessible.



Outstanding Contribution- City Employee or Team: Lindsey Schoenmakers



Lindsey played a critical role in the creation of the Economic Development Strategy.

The document was made accessible by an external consultant but when changes were made to the draft, all accessibility formatting was lost. Lindsey made it accessible once again.



Barbara McArthur Memorial Award of Distinction: John and Cheryl Hassan



John and Cheryl are both advocates for accessibility.

Through their work with the Alzheimer's Association, Brain Injury Association, Community Care, and Ross Memorial Hospital, they have worked diligently to make our community a better place for people with disabilities.
