THE PROBLEM

The primary care system in Ontario faces significant challenges, including a **shortage of family doctors, inadequate access to team-based care, and disparities in access between urban and rural areas.** These issues impact Ontarians' ability to access timely and appropriate healthcare, particularly in rural and northern regions.

The Problem

Doctor Shortage

Lack of Family Physicians:

A substantial number of Ontarians, estimated at 2.3 million, lack regular access to a family doctor.

Rural and Northern Areas:

The shortage is particularly acute in northern and rural regions, with numerous communities actively recruiting physicians.

Retirement Trends:

A significant portion of Ontario's physician workforce is nearing retirement, further exacerbating the shortage.

Limited Access to Team-Based Care

Government Investment:

The province is investing in expanding team-based care models, but the current implementation is not comprehensive.

Family Health Teams:

While team-based care, such as family health teams and community health centres, has proven beneficial, only a small fraction of Ontarians have access to it.

Geographic Disparities

Rural and Northern Challenges:


Rural and northern communities face unique challenges in recruiting and retaining physicians, with municipalities often bearing the burden of healthcare costs.

Without a family doctor, individuals may rely on emergency departments for primary care needs, leading to increased strain on the system.






